In a few hundred pages, the author delineated how the forces of economics and policy, racism and history, political decisions and social pressures collided, colluded, conflicted, and converged to create present-day metro-Detroit. Through this course, I finally understood the pressures driving people to the suburbs of Kalamazoo. I also understood I wanted to alleviate these pressures and change the future of urban America.

I felt I had seen the Ghosts of Cities Past, Present, and Future: If something is not done, then the same







forces that destroyed Detroit will continue to destroy cities now and into perpetuity. By the time the course ended, I knew: (1) I wanted to be an urban planner, contributing my talents to the development of vibrant, equitable, and sustainable urban communities in the U.S., and (2) planning requires more than land, ideas, and financing; it requires an organized citizenry advocating for policy changes and participating in the political process. So, I began organizing.

Upon completion of my degree, I plan to work in the private or nonprofit sector on neighborhood and commercial center revitalization in depressed urban areas. These areas require visionary planners working with communities to pioneer new ways of living.

Between now and the end of July, I will be Consulting Director, guiding Brendan into his new role and providing training for Jeremy as well. I will continue to work full time until July 29.
